What Are Nouns?

Nouns are words that name **people, places, things, or ideas**.

Common Nouns

- These are general names.
- They **do not** begin with capital letters (unless they start a sentence).
- Example: girl, city, school, dog

Proper Nouns

- These are specific names.
- They **always** begin with capital letters.
- Example: Emma, New York, Lincoln Middle School, Rover

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Capitalizing Titles Worksheet

Student Tip: Titles like **Mom, Dad, Doctor, or President** should be capitalized when they are used as names or come right before a name.

Example: "I asked **Mom** to help."

Example: "We saw **President Lincoln**."

✗ But if the title is used in a general way, **don't capitalize** it - like "my **mom** is nice" or "he wants to be a **doctor**."

Rule of thumb: If the title replaces or directly names someone, capitalize it!
